We are now facing the last Major regatta of the season. Getting to this point has been a major undertaking and it is clear that those involved with getting the facilities up to operational standards and maintaining that standard have done an amazing job. In real terms the whole face of Lake Ruataniwha has changed and we hope that all are suitably impressed with the results. We look forward to favourable conditions for the rest of this season.

Who Are We?

South Island Rowing Inc is an independent, non-profit organization set up by the four South Island Rowing Associations to own and operate the rowing facilities at Lake Ruataniwha. Membership is by virtue of being a member of one of these Local Associations. All members including the Office Bearers operate on a purely voluntary basis. Revenues come from sponsorship, facility hire charges and from the sale of goods through the "Row Shoppe" and the "Lakeside Café." We encourage all visitors and participants to the Complex to assist by purchasing goods and services from us and our sponsors.

Course

Following the recent working bee, the course work is now well advanced. Most of the buoys have been suitably arranged and the new Kevlar lane "wire" installed successfully. It is intended to install further buoys at the launch area to assist with traffic management and at the start area to assist with "herding" each crew into the correct starting blocks in an orderly and timely manner.

Safety

Safety is a very serious issue and everyone at the Lake needs to be aware of the dangers. This is a snow fed, hydro lake so it is cold and both the level and flow can change quickly and unexpectedly to meet the electricity generation requirements. Hypothermia is a very real risk to those who end up in the water and suitable safety arrangements (including clothing) must be made prior to venturing onto the water.

For those visiting this area, we recommend a wide range of clothing to cover all weather outcomes. We have had weather ranging from burning sun to snow falling and clothing plays a major role in making the most of the environment.



Those who attended Lake Ruataniwha two years ago will remember the weather variability...especially the wind that can transform the lake from tranquillity to a raging storm in a relatively short time. The Chief Umpire will ensure that maximum use of the

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available rowing time will be made. This means that crews need to be watchful in regards to the weather.

Environmental Protection

While not wanting to appear like a broken record I must repeat the Didymo message as many seem to have missed it last time. **Didymo** (aptly called rock snot) is a major problem and serious efforts are being made to minimise the potential for its transferral between lakes and rivers. All your boats <u>must</u> be washed when they come to Lake Ruataniwha and when they are taken from the Boat Park. Facilities will be available for this at the location pictured on the right.



There will be changes to the Boat Park operation including: restrictions and washing on entry at the start of the regatta, only boat entry/exit during the regatta and washing when leaving the boat park. We appreciate this may pose some short term difficulties but with the eyes of New Zealand are on us in this operation we feel this is worth the effort.

Fire Protection

There is a fire ban in the area so no open fires are allowed. The presence of trees and very dry grasses make for serious concerns here and we expect all visitors to the area to abide by the rural fire ban. All tents must be equipped with a fire extinguisher.

Power

The power cables for the main buildings are now fully operational. This has been a continuing saga of challenges but we now appear to have enough power to operate all the current facilities when required. We must acknowledge with thanks the special assistance from General Cables, Alex Wood and John Wylie.

Communications

All the speakers on the PA system have been replaced. Positive feedback from the last regattas indicates this has been a major improvement. The temporary cable has now been buried and this should add to the security. There is still some serious work to do to enable the television capture of the races.

We understand that there will be television coverage of the two finals day and this is expected to be for sale later in the year. This will mean some additional boats on the water and while every effort is being made to minimise the wake the reality is that will be a standard feature of National Regattas in the future. We also understand there may be a webcam operating for those who are unable to attend in person.



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

Works

The works we need to complete before the Maadi this year are well advanced and we expect to meet all the requirements expected of us. The latest works include:

All proceeds from this operation are used for operating and maintaining these facilities.





Row Shoppe

Located at the western end of the MacRae Building, the Row Shoppe will again be operating, providing souvenirs for attendees at this regatta. There is an extensive range of memorabilia and all should take the opportunity to obtain their mementos. All proceeds from this operation are used for operating and maintaining these facilities.

For your convenience there will be a few retail outlets and displays at the next regatta. These are mainly not for profit organizations or sponsors and we look forward to their support.

As in previous regattas, Kolourcare are the official photographers. There will be photos taken of all events and a number of candid shots as well. This is an excellent opportunity and we trust you to take advantage of the facility.

One issue that has arisen is that of tidiness. It is important that all the rubbish is placed into the skips provided. Over 4 cubic meters of plastic drink bottles were collected from the boat launch area alone. The cost of rubbish collection and disposal at two day regattas is about \$1000 and if you cannot guess, this does come from entry fees. Any
